Hart County Board of Commissioners met August 23, 2022 at 6:00 p.m. at Hart County Administrative & Emergency Services Center.

Chairman Marshall Sayer presided with Commissioners Michael Bennett, Frankie Teasley, Jeff Brown and Joey Dorsey in attendance.

1. Prayer

Prayer was offered by Commissioner Brown.

As we begin the first license renewal process, we have found a couple of Administrative changes we are requesting to be amended in the Ordinance.

Sec. 6-64. (a):

(a) Each license granted under this chapter shall automatically expire on the last day of December each year. The holder of a license must reapply on or before December 31 November 15 in order to be considered for renewal effective January 1 of the following year. Since the license is a privilege, there shall be no right to renewal, and a license may be denied for any reason set forth in this chapter.

We ask to change the date for Application to be changed from the 12/31 date to the 11/15 date to allow for time to process the application. The license expires on the 12/31 date if not changed it will delay the renewal past the January 1, date.

Sec. 6-76. (a)

(2) No person shall be permitted to serve or dispense distilled spirits for consumption on the premises until such person has applied for and received a permit from the Hart County Board of Commissioners' Office. Prior to issuing or renewing said permit, the Hart County Sheriff's Department shall conduct a criminal background check on the applicant and shall collect a nonrefundable investigative fee of \$20.00 from the applicant to offset the cost of this background check. Upon presentation of the criminal history information to the Board of Commissioners' office, the applicant shall pay an additional fee of \$10.00 for the issuance of the permit, which shall be valid for 12 months from the date through December 31 of the year of issue. Permits shall be renewed annually; a criminal background check is required for each renewal, and the fees specified herein shall be paid each time the permit is renewed.

We ask to change the date for servers expiration to match the license expiration date.

6-84. (d)

(d) On or before the tenth day of the month, a return for the preceding calendar month shall be filed with the Board of Commissioners or its authorized agent in

such a form as the Board of Commissioners or its authorized agent may prescribe by every licensee or agent liable for the payment of tax hereunder.

We ask that the remittance date be changed from the 10th to the 15th of the month.
